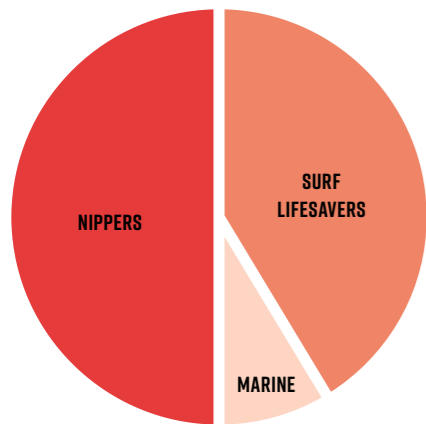

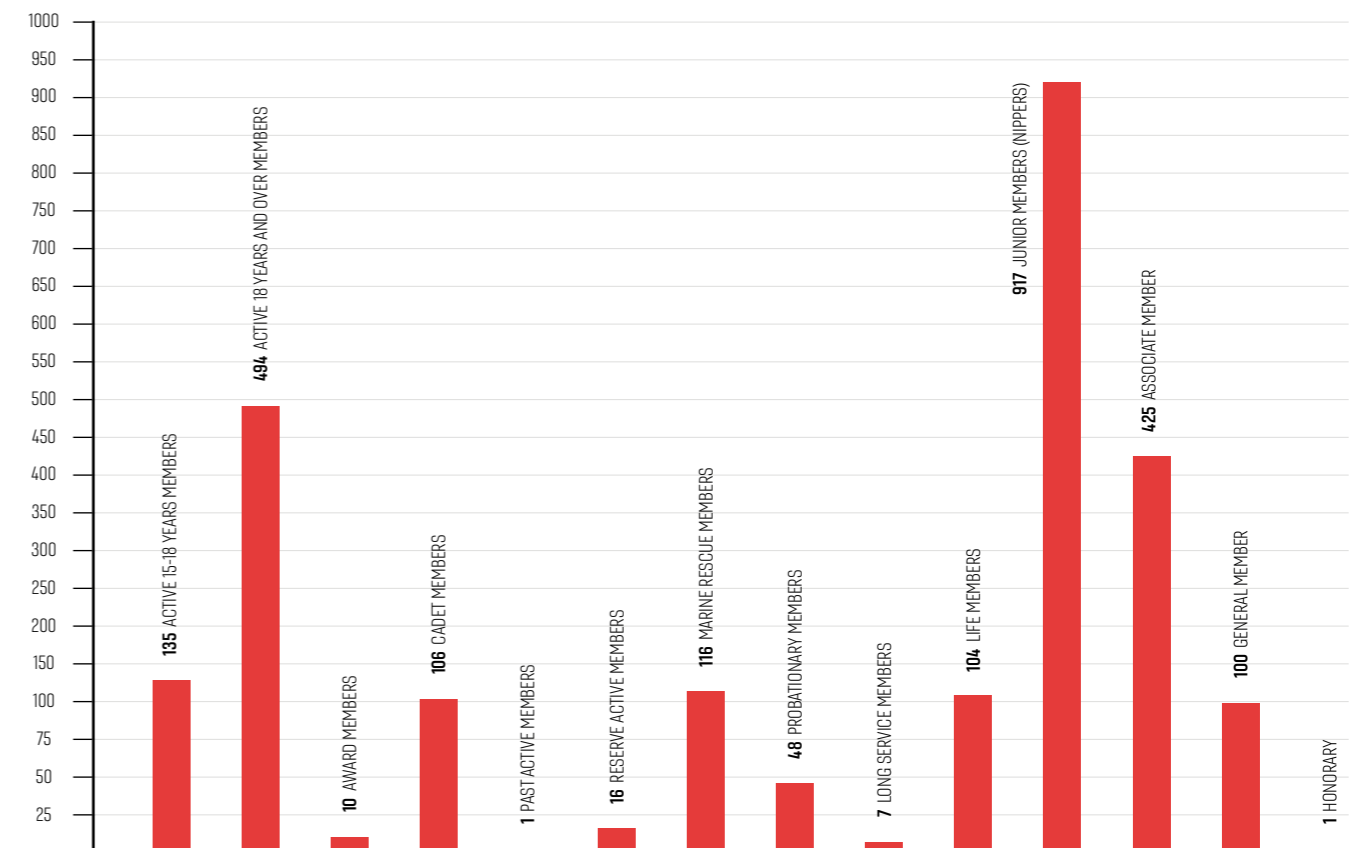

FROM THE PRESIDENT AND CEO

On behalf of Surf Life Saving Tasmania (SLST) it is our pleasure to present the 2019-2020 Annual Report.

In reflecting upon the 2019-20 season, it was an unprecedented year for everyone, however surf lifesaving in Tasmania adapted and continued to provide services and programs across the state, which is an achievement we are very proud of. The support of the Board, committees, clubs, units, members in being agile and working together was outstanding throughout year and especially as the impacts of COVID -19 hit.

SLST is acutely aware that our clubs, units and volunteers are the heart and strength of our amazing organisation. Our volunteers not only keep their local communities safe with services and programs they run but also provide SLST with the capacity for our beyond the flags services to inland, inshore and offshore water ways users.

YEARS HIGHLIGHTS

Our performance is measured against our business plan and key areas which will be further discussed in the remainder of the report. Overall, Surf Life Saving Tasmania managed to deliver on its key result areas.

SLST is continually working to enhance the delivery of volunteer lifesaving patrols and services on Tasmanian beaches and aquatic environments. Our surf life saving clubs, marine rescue units and support services performed 21,535 recorded patrol hours, performed 124 rescues, 4,074 preventative actions, treated 108 First aid cases and responded to 31 activations from the Tasmanian Police.

The efforts of clubs and services, and their Trainers and Assessors were significant with 465 surf lifesaving awards issued, which is a positive 5% increase on the previous season.

The 2019-20 Surf Sport season was a challenging year for members with an increased participation at state wide carnivals for junior and seniors. Unfortunately, COVID-19 brought the season to abrupt end with the Open Championships and Australian Championships cancelled.

SLST celebrated the outstanding contribution of our clubs and volunteers during the 2019-20 season at the Awards of Excellence held on the 15th August 2020 with an online event. The night highlighted the commitment and outstanding achievements of our volunteer members to surf lifesaving and their dedication to our mission to save lives, create great Australians and build healthy and safe communities. It was very exciting to see the

Penguin SLSC win the SLSA Club of the Year in recognition of the efforts of its members over the past several years for its members and the local community.

We strive to be proactive in an attempt to reduce our state drowning statistics through education. SLST facilitated a range of community education programs to over 30,000 Tasmanians, promoting surf safety education and awareness as a crucial part of breaking the drowning cycle.

YEAR'S CHALLENGES

There are always numerous challenges for such a diverse organisation such as Surf Life Saving Tasmania. We all face the challenge of re-emerging and resuming activities as we adjust to the new normal with COVID-19. We have many stakeholders we try to deliver numerous programs on behalf of or for. This stretches our limited resources both human, equipment and finances. A key goal of the organisation is to build a sustainable long term funding base.

THE FUTURE

Change does not occur in the blink of an eye. Surf Life Saving Tasmania has many stretch goals to achieve beyond 2020 including positioning the organisation for the next 100 years of keeping the community safe with Burnie celebrating 100 years in 2021. To achieve this and to realise our vision of 'Zero preventable deaths in Tasmanian waters' we need to ensure the wellbeing and support of our members, continued support and the trust of our stakeholders.

2019-2020 LIFESAVING OPERATIONS

Lifesaving operations have grown this past year. Volunteers from our Surf Life Saving Clubs and Marine Rescue Units provided in excess of 21,000 volunteer hours keeping their local communities safe. 2019-20 saw an increase of Tasmanian Police activations across all areas of the state outside of traditional patrols.

PATROLLING

Patrolling is the core lifesaving business for our clubs and the commitment of all patrolling members across the state doesn't go unnoticed and each and every one of them is thanked for the hours that you have put in.

An integral part of our patrolling commitment for continual improvement are Patrol Assessments, these are delivered by volunteer Patrol Assessors, they do these assessments across all clubs 3-4 times a season, the time that these volunteers put in is greatly appreciated.

COVID-19 saw our season finish early luckily only by 2 days on the last weekend in March were not patrolled, COVID will continue to throw up challenges for our patrol members as we move into another season, but we are confident we will all meet the challenges head on and continue to provide this most integral part of our service.

SLSA OPERATIONS APP FOR PATROLS

The Operations App has continued to be developed by SLSA and now includes all logs as well as support service operations, this wonderful technological advance has proven that technology goes along side our members commitment to patrolling and has reduced the members concerns around hardcopy logs and recording patrol hours and incidents.

BEYOND THE FLAGS – TOTAL SERVICE PLAN

Our Clubs, Services and Marine Rescue units across the state are showing by their actions the desire to get involved as we continue to grow beyond the traditional patrol seen in the past.

Inland, inshore and offshore rescue in the state by the dedicated work of our specialist teams in Marine Rescue, Flood Swiftwater and club and Unit based Emergency Response Teams continue to provide pathways of interest for all members. We have been activated over 30 times again through our 13SURF call out system. The work that volunteers from our clubs and units responding and the Duty Officers do should be commended.

Our radio capability around the state continues to grow being driven by Greg Bird who brings a wealth of knowledge to this most critical part of how we run our business and how we communicate and keep our members safe.

Our Flood Swiftwater training program has seen our 2 volunteer trainers challenge our members whilst on course with some great feedback from those attending gaining the skills and underpinning knowledge to keep themselves safe but also provide a highly trained and professional response when required.

Our Marine Rescue Units across the state continue to show growth in membership and response to incidents, some new vessels and a training partnership with Seafood and Maritime Training has shown that this sector of our business is being seen as a pathway for our between the flag patrolling member as they move through their lifesaving journey.

MEMBER TRAINING

The work put into empowering Trainers, Assessors and Facilitators (TAFs) and reducing the administration burden across the area of training as a whole, meant clubs showed self-sufficiency in this area in 2019/20. For many it was a case of 'business as usual' and for others, they were looking for ways to value add to the offer to their members experience in training. From the State Office, attention was also given to 'Beyond the Flags' and broadening the organisations capabilities within the Marine Rescue and Flood Water Rescue realms. Also, introduction of new age technologies and the continued use of drones had the organisation show potential to become a "game changer" in search and rescue space.

The efforts of clubs and services, and their Trainers and Assessors are a significant factor in being able to provide a strong community service across the state. In 2019/20, SLST issued 465 (443 in 2018/19) surf lifesaving awards which is a positive 5% increase on the previous season. This shows a strong commitment to upskilling and developing our members, as we continue to extend our services.

TRAINERS AND ASSESSORS

In October, Training and Assessment Updates were delivered in Webinar format. One huge positive about an online event, was that it was much more accessible for a wider audience to take part and watch from the comfort of their homes. Something that has now become the norm in COVID-times. The update covered use of IT systems including apps and eLearning, skills maintenance and some of the finer details around admin requirements within training and assessment. A number of initiatives continued as part of the nationally known VET Surge Project, specifically designed to reduce administration burdens for all and introduce innovation into the everyday lives of our volunteers.

BEYOND THE FLAGS - LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT

SLST's capabilities to provide support via its Rescue Services continued to develop in 2019/20. SLST Rescue Services, brings together Marine Rescue, Rescue Water Craft (RWC), Emergency Response Teams (ERT) and Flood and Swift Water Rescue, increased in the number of qualified volunteers within SLST and Tasmania Police (TasPol) with interagency training and qualifications to work effectively during frontline emergencies.

The enthusiasm to attain advanced awards also continued to grow. More members have taken on Emergency Care awards such as Advanced First Aid, Wilderness First Aid and Advanced Resuscitation, during the season. There is definitely a want seen from our members to broaden their skills and expertise 'beyond the flags'.

SLST offered both internally facilitated courses through AMSA endorsed RTQ, Volunteer Marine Rescue Queensland (VMRAQ) as well as our preferred external training provider Seafood and Maritime Training (SMT). These included Marine Rescue Restricted Coxswain training, two Elements of Shipboard Safety courses and Navigation training. Unfortunately, our latest course fell at a time whereby COVID-19 restrictions meant putting the training on pause. Our volunteers have since resumed training to providing 'world class' inland, inshore and offshore search and rescue services.

SLST facilitates Flood Swift Water Rescue Technician courses at The Arm River Forestry Camp on the Mersey River. The aim of the training was to introduce white-water rescue skills, knowledge and industry techniques to surf lifesavers. The program had been previously delivered to and suited a varying range of candidates from outdoor professionals such as guides and instructors, to anyone who comes into contact with a moving water environment. Later on, this training was delivered to a group from TasPol and from this SLST will continue to upskill officers with the Flood Swift Water Skillset going forward.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

Developing our members to become great Australians is at the foundation of everything we do and we have achieved some great successes over the past twelve months.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT - NIPPERS

Nippers is symbolic to surf lifesaving and our 5 to 13-year-old members are part of the biggest junior program in the country. Our 15 Surf Life Saving Clubs around Tasmania offer a nipper's program as the first entry point.

The Junior Education pathway is paramount to delivering a great experience to our future lifesavers this is delivered at every club by a group of dedicated volunteer Coaches, Age Mangers and Parents and the work these volunteers put into this area cannot be undervalued in any way as playing a significant role in nurturing our junior members.

JUNIOR SURF LIFESAVER OF THE YEAR

The Junior Surf Lifesaver of the Year award is a much sought after accolade that every U14 member strives to be their clubs nominee. The award is based on a number of achievements including the nominees' involvement in surf lifesaving during the current season, their history in surf lifesaving, their future vision for surf lifesaving, their achievements over the past season including leadership roles, lifesaving and sporting achievements and contribution to other community organisations. Each year the interview panel assessing nominees is amazed by the passion, commitment and enthusiasm of our members.

In 2019/2020 the Junior Surf Lifesaver of the year was awarded to Fletcher Kable from Penguin SLSC.

SLST LIFESAVING DEVELOPMENT CAMP

The Lifesaving Development Camp was delivered for the seventh year in Tasmania, targeting surf life savers aged sixteen to twenty-one. This intensive training camp is a seven day live in program that builds on the participants knowledge gained through their time in surf lifesaving and to take their knowledge and skill to the next level.

Since 2014, the camp has developed to suit the needs of our state and members and what has evolved is a 7-day live in program to develop and enhance the knowledge and skills of young people to the next level, while at the same time preparing them to take on more responsibility in their patrol teams, their own clubs and the wider community.

This is achieved by providing the young people who attend the Lifesaving Development Camp with a higher level of award training, and exposure to exciting, fast-paced simulated lifesaving scenarios. Camp attendees use the standard patrolling equipment to manage 'No Notice' scenarios that become more complex as their skills develop. This style of delivery uses expert feedback to cement skills and knowledge in a relevant and practical medium. Successful participants of the Lifesaving Development Camp receive awards in First Aid, Advanced Resuscitation Techniques and IRB Crew Certificate.

The camp is fully planned and run by a volunteer management and leadership team. Many past camp participants come back in these roles and gain leadership and management skills that prepare them for careers and other endeavors in their lives within and outside of surf lifesaving.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMS



SLST facilitated community education programs enables the organisation, as a whole, greater opportunity for people to become connected through standalone, side by side and adhoc programs promoting surf safety education and awareness as a crucial part of breaking the drowning cycle. We continue to work hard towards supporting and empowering local clubs to be able to open their doors to a wider audience and to be inclusive of all members of their community regardless of their background and ability, and to be able to offer a range of opportunities that meet their individual needs and wants. Our programs extend far beyond just sport itself and definitely 'Between the Flags'. We appreciate the role in bringing communities closer together, deliver social and cultural impacts and promote social cohesion. Promoting and delivering on three key Strategic Priorities – Learning for Life, Active for Life and Involving all Australians.

SLST is passionate about ensuring that everyone benefits from the positive outcomes through an array of community education programs. School students are our largest cohort engaging with SLST through 'off the shelf' and tailored programs to value add to their existing curriculum and schools' strategic goals. Each year, on average SLST engages with approximately 30,000 Tasmanian's through various Community Education Programs and in 2019/20, 15,162 participants were youth.

BEACH TO BUSH

Australia's most popular primary aged surf education program once again hit the road between October and December, reaching 2,477 Tasmanian Primary Schools students. Each year, we aim for program growth both in terms of participation, duration and geographical reach as we strive to deliver to every Tasmanian Primary School in a 3-year cycle. Beach to Bush targets the states youngest at-risk group as it has been determined that one of the best way to begin to educate children about being safe around the water is to take the lessons to them.

READY.SET.RESCUE

To offer a pathway for middle-primary ages, they access our Ready.Set.Rescue program, which provides children with a practical lifesaving activity at their nearest beach or waterway, delivered by accredited surf lifesaving sport coaches and promotes health and wellbeing. The Ready.Set.Rescue initiative is an accredited Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools Activity. To date, we have delivered 30 programs and had nearly 1,500 engagements with Primary Aged Students through consecutive 1-1.5-hour sessions, half and full day 'carnival-type' programs at schools in Wynyard through to South Arm. Last year, Triabunna District School, took a whole school approach to engaging with surf life saving.

SURF SURVIVAL

Surf Survival is one of surf lifesavings programs designed to embrace all Australians regardless of their ethnicity, religious or cultural background, gender or socioeconomic status. Through the delivery of the Surf Survival Program within High Schools, SLST has identified and targeted low-socio economic and at-risk communities with the opportunity to develop physically, socially and emotionally. The skills and abilities developed through the program are not only specific to surf lifesaving and therefore allow for growth and development in other aspects of their lives. In 2019/20, SLST

delivered Surf Survival to over 400 High School students across 6 schools through on-the-beach programs.

PARTNERSHIPS WITH SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

SLST's Teachers Endorsement program has continued to be rolled out to build and formalise partnerships with schools and colleges to ensure long term involvement in SLS programs within the educational setting - leading to safer beaches through a greater understanding of beach safety and the training of future surf lifesavers. SLST also teamed up with Rosny College for a third year running to provide students the opportunity to complete a placement within the State Office to work towards obtaining their Certificate II in Business. All students who have been part of this program have not come from a surf life saving background, but have recognised the value Surf Life Saving can have as an employer on their resume, especially for those who are pursuing a career in the Emergency Services. As well as offering lifesaving pathways for students, in 2019/20 SLST delivered personal development sessions, including an Introduction to First Aid to 120 Teachers.

MULTICULTURAL PROGRAMS

SLST has been working with Tasmania's various multicultural communities for more than 10 years. In 2019/20, one of the programs – Meet the Beach – encouraged activities that increased the capacity within ethnic communities and multicultural networks to self-manage and engage in community life. The aim was to achieve this by teaching safe water usage techniques and lifesaving skills. As well as, encouraging the using of community facilities that would result in increased participation of new migrants in sport, recreation and social clubs. The sessions brought many young people together to socialise, be active, whilst learning how to be safe in and around the water.

ACCESSIBLE BEACHES PROGRAMS

From barely dipping toes to 'wanting to be a Lifesaver', SLST's Starfish Nippers program aimed to break down perceived and real barriers for 30 special needs children who attended the Starfish Nippers event at Long Beach, Sandy Bay in January. Starfish Nippers' is just one example of a targeted aquatic education program that had a major emphasis on water safety and empowering people with disabilities and their families (and support networks) to use lifesaving skills in a range of aquatic environments. In 2019/20 the following clubs across the state also hosted their own Starfish Nippers and Inclusive Beaches Programs; Devonport SLSC, Kingston Beach SLSC, Clifton Beach SLSC and Carlton Park SLSC. In addition to these

programs, SLST also supported and celebrated International Day of People with Disability to be part of the Day on the Foreshore event (a Tascare initiative) in December at Montrose Bay.

In 2019, Surf Life Saving Tasmania (SLST) added another Beach Wheelchair to our fleet thanks to the Aurora Energy Community Grant. This is accessible from the Somerset SLSC and available to hire at no cost to the community in the surrounding areas. This has and will continue to enable greater accessibility to our programs targeted at people with disabilities of all ages on the North West Coast. Additionally, for a third year, having chairs available to hire at no cost and based at Longbeach, Sandy Bay for the duration of the summer enabled people of all ages with disabilities and serious illness the opportunity to enjoy the beach.

RURAL AND REMOTE COMMUNITIES

HEALTHY GEORGE TOWN – BOARD PADDLING AND NIPPERS

Over the Summer months, SLST were proudly part of the Healthy George Town program (developed in partnership with Healthy Tasmania Pty Ltd) offering free board paddling (over 13s) and Nipper activities to the community. An evidence-based, community-wide, holistic, collaborative and sustainable health and wellbeing project, Healthy George Town aims to create a safe, connected, vibrant, healthy and positive community - and it was FREE for all participants!

VAC SURF

SLST were excited to be able to continue to offer After School, Holiday Program and Childcare Providers the opportunity to be part of our Vac Surf Ed program in 2019/20. The Surf Life Saving program focuses on beach safety skills and aquatics rescues, as well as developing confidence in the water. This year 135 Primary-aged children participated in a Vac Surf Ed Program.

Other celebrations include:

- 79 Community Lifeguard Bookings reaching nearly 7,000 School Students
- 4 events, approx. 5,000 Tasmanian Triathlon Schools Challenge (Primary and Secondary)
- Part of the Oatlands Pool 'Water Safety Fun Day'

LIFEGUARD SERVICES

In 2019/20 SLST's Lifeguard Services continued to provide a valuable enabler and safety service to community groups and schools. Even though the season was cut short due to COVID-19, Community Lifeguards were privately booked on 79 occasions, providing water safety to nearly 30,000 beach users and equating to 1,245 Lifeguard water safety hours.

WEEKDAY LIFEGUARD SERVICES

Throughout the Summer of 2019, SLST continued to provide the Weekday Lifeguard Service at Long Beach, Sandy Bay alongside the scheduled continuation of the Clifton Beach Lifeguard Service – a seven day-a-week lifesaving service provided in partnership with the Clifton Beach SLSC and the proactive Clarence City Council over the summer school holiday period. At Sandy Bay, the Lifeguards not only provided a patrol service to visitors, but regularly educated the public on water safety messages and through the delivery of a range of Community Education Programs. This included the popular Vac Surf Program that saw groups from vacation care centres participate in fun surf safety and beach awareness activities on the beach and in the water. SLST's Beach Wheelchair was available to be hired at no cost for the duration of the service. Over the last five years, SLST has worked hard to create a accessible 'hub' for aquatic activities within close proximity to Hobart CBD.

EVENT WATER SAFETY

A key event in our Water Safety Calendar is The Falls Festival as SLST supports the event by coordinating a team of Volunteer Lifesavers to patrol Marion Bay for Festival go-ers to be able to enjoy the beach safely over the New Year Period.



SLST have been supporting the Schools Triathlon Challenge in Hobart and Devonport for a number of years. With this event attracting over 5,000 students from both Primary and High Schools, this is a great opportunity to promote Surf Life Saving to the masses and also ensure the utmost safety of all participants competing and spectating the event.

CAREER PATHWAYS IN LIFESAVING

Another highlight of the season was that SLST was able to continue to provide casual employment opportunities and a career pathways to our surf life saving club members statewide. We saw a large number of casuals returning for another season which has had a positive effect on the capacity and capability to deliver statewide Community Programs. Equally as exciting was the healthy number of new recruits coming on board. The Supervising roles stepped up to in the 'behind the scenes' functions of the service in 2019. They coordinated the formation of teams that meant logistically we were in the best position position to take on an increased number of bookings. Separately, teams were set up to specialise and take ownership of certain programs, giving a personable and professional approach to our service. These individuals are actively involved with the development of initiatives and invested in their success, which is really promising for the sustainability of the organisation as a whole.

Equally, and undoubtedly as a result of the Lifesaving Development Camp program, our youth continue to develop skills in areas such as advanced emergency care and beach management. We have seen these individuals transfer such skills and applying themselves professionally through paid Lifeguarding and Community Education pathways. Each year, seasonal recruitment opportunities are becoming increasingly more competitive and sought after.

PUBLIC TRAINING

Surf Life Saving Tasmania has continued to grow sustainable discretionary revenue streams to financially support the organisation and deliver on our strategic priorities. In particular, we have focussed on areas that support our mission to save lives, create great Australians and build healthy and safe communities.

With our years of experience keeping the community safe and saving lives, we are applying this knowledge and experience to provide relevant training and education in areas such as first aid, risk management, use of power craft/ boating, also through community education programs for all ages and lifeguard services.

PUBLIC TRAINING

In 2019/20, over 1,200 members of the Tasmanian Community accessed training offered by SLST. SLST issued 695 Nationally Recognised Qualifications and 1,913 Units of Competencies in First Aid, CPR, Pool Lifeguard and Community Surf Life Saving Certificate. In addition, as a Marine and Safety Tasmania (MAST) Endorsed Training Provider SLST delivered 252 Boat Licence and 253 Personal Water Craft Endorsements.

Since becoming a Public Training Licensee of Lifesaving Victoria back in 2017, SLST has improved accessibility and customer satisfaction to our training through applying innovative thinking and use of digital technology. We pride ourselves on being able to offer a range of course delivery options that aim to meet the learner's needs and circumstances. Our suite of online learning has given learners greater flexibility than ever before. Whilst this seems to be the preferred choice for our candidates, we continued to offer a range of face-to-face only course options.

FIRST AID & CPR

Almost 10 million people are admitted to Australian hospitals each year as the result of an accident or injury. Any one of us may have to perform first aid at some point in our lives and it is vital that all Tasmanians can confidently take control of a potentially life threatening emergencies until medical assistance arrives.

SLST's First Aid Training Courses is recommended for any person employed as an occupation health and safety or first aid representatives or who needs the qualification for their work. It is also recommended for anybody working as a care worker, sports coach, trainer, educator, or a person working in a high risk environment. In 2019/20, we continued to service our existing major partner, Westpac with training and First Aid and AED audits and also secured a number of state wide contracts for training within the retail and building industries.

COMMUNITY SURF LIFE SAVING CERTIFICATE

The Community Surf Life Saving Certificate course provided 304 teachers, surf instructors and other outdoor recreation members the training to develop their knowledge and skills to be able to supervise structured recreational activities at dynamic open water, aquatic venues/ environments. A promising number of new candidates obtaining, as well as those who are maintaining, this qualification means there is a significant number of people supervising others in aquatic environments with an increased awareness and knowledge around risk management, surf awareness, rescue techniques and CPR. Each year, we receive requests for courses to run outside of our usual October to April schedule, which is encouraging as it shows that people in roles of responsibility are seeing value in the training offered. It also shows that people are getting out more, outside of the warmer months to take advantage of Tasmania's 4,882km of coastline, 1,260 plus accessible beaches and amazing waterways.



BOAT AND JET SKI COURSES

It was another massive year for SLST Boat and PWC Training, with a total of 252 members of the Tasmanian community gaining their Recreational Boat Licence and 253 upskilling to add on a PWC Endorsement onto their license. Completing training on what you need to know to safely enjoy their craft. A large number of SLST members also completed this training to obtain a license as a prerequisite of commencing Inshore Rescue Boat (IRB Driver) training delivered within our clubs by our volunteer Trainers and Assessors.

Once again, family and private group bookings proved popular this year, and many provisional licenses and endorsements were issued. For individuals aged between 12 and 16 a provisional licence can be obtained. We saw families offering this training to their children early, instead of waiting until they come of age for a full license which was great to see. Feedback was positive from the groups we worked with as they felt that tailoring courses to their family/ group needs meant that they felt more confident amongst peers. Some of these courses lead to one-on-one follow up sessions, as the request of the individual, to further refine skills. This is something we hope to do more of in the future.

SURF SPORTS

The 2019-20 Surf Sport season was dominated with adverse weather, large swells which made for close racing and surf skills being shown but ultimately the COVID-19 virus brought the season to abrupt end.

ENDURANCE SERIES

The Somerset, North West and Surf Safari were all run again this year. The three events conducted during the months of October to November with surf boats, skis and boards racing over various distances. The 51st Surf Safari was part of the Australian Ocean Ski Racing series points score.

COOLANGATTA GOLD

The iconic event attracted good numbers from Tasmania proving that the tough winter training conditions is no deterrent. Craig Sly again acquitted himself well in taking Silver in the over 50 category and the Carlton Park mixed 190 team achieved gold for the 2nd year. Ex pat, Matt Bevilacqua, had an outstanding race to take out the men's elite event.

STATE WIDE CARNIVALS

The four senior statewide carnivals were based on the Tasmanian Surf League (TSL) format. Burnie were for the second year the TSL Metro point score winners with Port Sorell taking out the TSL Country title for the second year as well. A new concept focusing on mixed club participation in teams will be launched in 2021.

Junior carnivals were well attended and demonstrates a healthy future for surf sports in the state.

The interclub competition in the Juniors was much closer than the senior point score with most clubs participating and improving their position.

The Boat Harbour club worked closely with the local community and other clubs to put on a great event the first for them for a number of years.

Thanks to all the host clubs for their support over the season.

CHAMPIONSHIP EVENTS

TASMANIAN MASTERS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Beautiful Bridport was the background for the 2019/20 Masters Championships and the morning was bathed in sunshine, which continued for the day, in addition to a moderate Nor Westerly mid-morning.

The clubhouse looked splendid as a result of ongoing capital works and the newly concreted pathway to the beach made it very easy to access the beach.

Many thanks must also go out to our referee, Julian Hickey, the dynamic Eustace duo of Anne and Elizabeth, Rodney Solomon and all of the water safety and club volunteers that contribute to make for such a great annual event.

TASMANIAN JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Carlton Park hosted the Junior Championships. The conditions were more akin to those experienced at Queensland or NSW surf carnivals. Unfortunately the building surf on the Sunday bought a premature end to the carnival but not before the young surf lifesavers put on a great display.

The challenging conditions were the envy of senior competitors but it did provide the young athletes, coaches and age managers the opportunity to experience changing conditions of the ocean.

Amongst the many highlights was the participation 11 of the 13 clubs from all parts of the state.

Carnival referee, Craig Mackinnon and his team of officials, are to be commended for conducting such a great event in the difficult circumstances with the overriding mantra of ensuring participant safety.

In hindsight it was a great finale to the season as it was the last event conducted before the shutdown.

TASMANIAN OCEAN SWIM SERIES

The Engine Tasmanian Ocean Swim Series kicked off in November with the series attracting elite and recreational swimmers. The series continues to provide an important link to other aquatic sports entities and the wider community with participation numbers consistent with previous years. Unfortunately the COVID-19 virus prevented the last two races to be conducted but series winners were able to be recognised.

SURF BOAT ROWING

We experienced some great racing particularly on the carnivals held at Penguin, Boat Harbour and Burnie.

The Penguin U23 boys set the pace in the Men's and the Burnie Grit in the Ladies.

Despite the challenges of the season there were some great highlights including Somerset ladies participating in the marathons and the Burnie Masters Men again flying the flag for the state at the ARSL titles in February in NSW where they gained a bronze medal.

Planning has commenced to get more boats on the water and reinvigorate boat rowing in the state.

SURF SPORT EXECUTIVE INITIATIVES

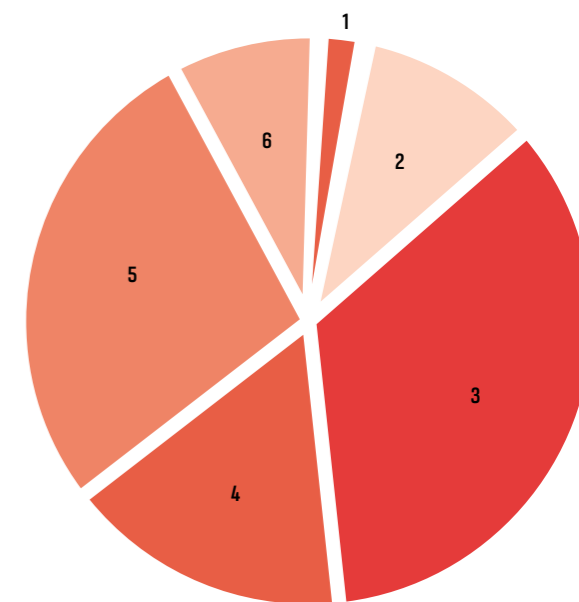
The early end to the competition season due to COVID-19 resulted in the cancellation of the Tasmanian Senior Championships, the Aussies and a number of other related events.

CELEBRATING OUR CLUBS AND MARINE RESCUE UNITS



KINGSTON BEACH SLSC

Kingston Beach SLSC were successful in receiving funding through the Ambulance Tasmania Community Defibrillator Fund to provide a public defibrillator to share with the beach town community. Access to the defibrillator maximises the clubs commitment to community safety. As part of the launch the club offered free defibrillator and CPR training to local businesses and community groups.



FREYCINET VMR

At dawn on Sunday 22 September 2019, four members of Freycinet VMR, with their rescue boat in tow, departed Swansea bound for Dodges Ferry to take part in a marine Search and Rescue Exercise on Frederick Henry Bay. For three of the four members on board for the day it was their first opportunity to operate alongside Police and other volunteer marine rescue vessels in a joint exercise. After four hours on the water, members were very well aware of the conditions they might expect when required to conduct an extended search during a real emergency. By the time the rescue vessel was returned to Swansea, refuelled and all gear washed, dried and stowed away, the four members had contributed a total of 56 volunteer-hours to take part in the exercise.



LAUNCESTON LSC

In December 2019 the Launceston LSC worked with the Tasmanian Fire Service, Ambulance Tasmania and Tasmania Police to retrieve injured patients from Launceston's Cataract Gorge. This retrieval highlights the rescue capability of our Clubs/Unit volunteers and the working relationship with Tasmanian Emergency Service organisations.



ST HELENS MARINE RESCUE

Break O'Day Council, Volunteer of the Month, Ken Clark has volunteered countless hours for over 16 years with St Helens Marine Rescue where he helps and ensures the safety of boaters, anglers and any other persons in or on the water. The seafaring community around St Helens are very thankful that the members of St Helens Marine Rescue give up their valuable time for the sake of those who can sometimes be in serious life threatening and dangerous situations.



BOAT HARBOUR BEACH

Boat Harbour Beach SLSC hosted its first full round of Statewide Carnivals in 20 Years! With 11 clubs participating, 134 Senior and 308 Nippers enjoying the location and friendly competition, it was a welcome return to hosting carnivals.



DEVONPORT SLSC

For the first time the Starfish Nippers program for children and young adults with disabilities was run on the North-West Coast.

With a grant from Surf Life Saving Australia inclusive beaches program and the support of Free Masons Tasmania the club has secured an adapted rescue board, parachutes, soft equipment and high visibility rash vests to bring the program to life.

The program is about giving people with disabilities the opportunity to participate in a program that their peers participate in. The Club aims to run the program alongside the regular nippers program so that all the kids will be on the beach participating together.



PORT SORELL SLSC

Port Sorell SLSC received funding from the Federal Government Community Development Grants Program to assist with the development of much needed additional change and toilet facilities, freeing up equipment storage within the existing club. The local community will also benefit greatly from the project by the provision of public toilet and shower facilities adjacent to the popular Freers Beach and "Pirate Park". The project has also received financial support from the Tasmanian Government and Latrobe Council.



CLIFTON BEACH SLSC

Clifton Beach SLSC hosted Tasmania's first Hydrothon, an All Female Surf Sports Festival to help celebrate 40 years of women in surf lifesaving. The event was huge success with over 120 girls taking part from across Tasmania. Importantly the event achieved the goal of raising the awareness and importance of female participation in sport. Female members from all surf life saving clubs involved had the opportunity to engage and learn from surf lifesaving's leading iron women.



PENGUIN SLSC

Penguin SLSC Life Members and Nippers celebrated the arrival of our new boards thanks to grant funds received through the Tasmanian Community Fund.

Penguin Surf Life Saving Club is hoping to preserve its history by dedicating new equipment to its life members. The club has named six fibreglass nipper boards in honour of its first life members: Lou Stubbs, Ken Knight, Ron Revell, Ray Howe, Harry Overall and Tom Edwards.

The club plans to honour more life members as it acquires new equipment, in doing so creating awareness amongst younger members of the club's history.

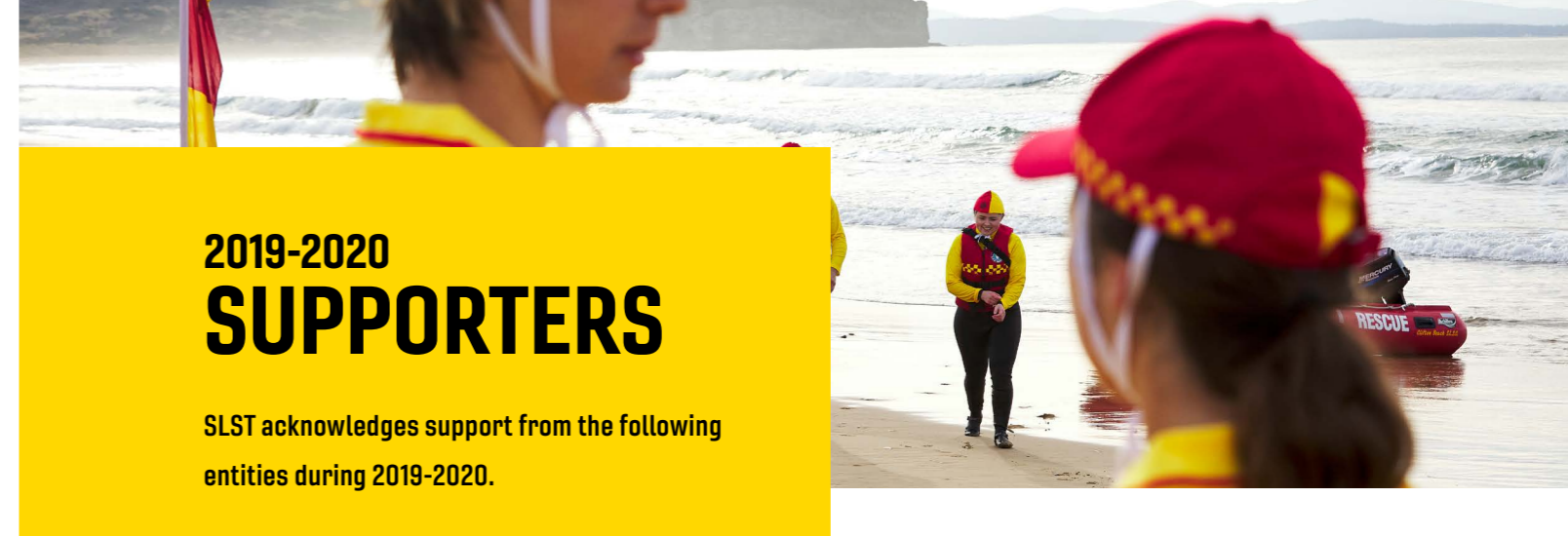

Notes of the Financial Statements

SURF LIFE SAVING TASMANIA INC For the year ended 30 June 2020

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

- Purpose:** The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (Tasmania), the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and for distribution to its members. The executive officers have determined, in their opinion, that the association is not a reporting entity.
- Basis of preparation:** The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals and going concern basis, and based on historic costs. The following Australian Accounting Standards have been used in the preparation of the financial statements, as deemed appropriate by the Executive:

 - AASB 15* - Revenue from Contracts with Customers
 - AASB 16* - Leases
 - AASB 101 - Presentation of Financial Statements
 - AASB 102 - Inventories
 - AASB 107 - Statement of Cash Flows
 - AASB 108 - Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
 - AASB 119 - Employee Benefits
 - AASB 1048 - Interpretation of Standards
 - AASB 1054 - Australian Additional Disclosures
 - AASB 1058* - Income of Not-for-profit Entities

* new standards adopted this financial year.
- Changes in significant accounting policies:** refer note 1.14 below - new accounting standards adopted.
- Revenue and other income (including Government Grants & Interest):** is recognised net of GST in the Statement of Income and Expenditure at such time as the goods or services have been provided (typically at time of invoice). Government grants are recognised in accordance with AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers and AASB 1058 Income for Not-for-profit Entities - typically in the Statement of Income & Expenditure in the same year as receipt. Interest income is recognised and accrued for within the period being reported using the effective interest rate method.
- Cash & cash equivalents:** includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less.
- Accounts Receivable and other debtors:** represent the outstanding balances receivable at the end of the reporting period for goods and services provided by the association that remain unpaid. The amounts are expected to be received within 12 months, and therefore included in Current Assets. An Expected Credit Loss (as per AASB 9) has been taken off this balance after determining the likelihood for receiving older outstanding balances.
- Non-current Assets and Depreciation:** are held at historic cost less accumulated depreciation, unless otherwise noted, and depreciation determined over the useful life of the assets - typically 5-15 years.
- Impairment of Assets:** the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets at the end of each reporting period, to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.
- Accounts Payable and other payables:** represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.
- Employee Provisions:** is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. These amounts include on-costs for the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. The long-service leave provision has been calculated with a probability range of 10-100% based on the number of years of service for each employee.
- Goods and services tax (GST):** Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement. Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flow arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

12. **Income Tax:** The Association is an income tax exempt organisation pursuant to the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.
13. **Subsequent events:** There have been no known events subsequent to balance date that would materially impact on these financial statements.

14. **New standards and interpretations now adopted:**

AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers becomes effective 1 July 2019. This is a new standard in which revenue is recognised to depict the transfer of control of promised goods and services to a customer (rather than when risks and rewards transfers) at the amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled. Having reviewed grants and sponsorship contracts, we have deemed AASB 15 does not apply.

AASB 1058 Income for Not-for-profit Entities becomes effective 1 July 2019. This is a new standard that replaces the income recognition requirements relating to private sector not-for-profit (NFP) entities, as well as the majority of income recognition requirements relating to public sector NFP entities previously reflected in AASB 1004 Contributions.

AASB 16 Leases becomes effective 1 July 2019. This is a new standard that abolishes the concept of the operating lease for lessees by creating a single model for lessees and recognises a 'right of use' asset and financial liability for all leases.

11. Unexpended Grant & Sponsorship Income

In line with the introduction of the International Financial Reporting Standards, and specifically the Australian Accounting Standard AASB 1058 - Income of Not-for-Profit Entities, all operational Grant and Sponsorship Income is now brought to account within the Income and Expenditure Statement at the time of receipt (as opposed to contract revenue, which would be treated differently under AASB 15). To assist with the comparison of the prior year, all Unexpended Grant and Sponsorship income as at 30 June 2019 has been re-allocated directly to Retained Earnings.

12. Reserves

- **Future Fund Reserve** - to assist with the future financial sustainability of the organisation.
- **VMR Reserve** - to set aside unexpended Grants and other funds in relation to the Volunteer Marine Rescue (VMR) operations. Of the \$87,197 funds in reserve, \$42,821 relate to unspent MAST Grant monies (\$42,063 Vessel Replacement and \$758 Operations).
- **Surf Boat Rowers Reserve Fund** - to set aside funds specifically related to the Surf Boat Rowers group.
- **Unexpended Grant and Sponsorship Fund Reserve** - established this year to represent grant and sponsorship amounts yet to be expended but have been brought to account in the profit and loss in accordance with AASB 1058.

13. Capital Works Expenditure

Capital Works Expenditure is shown in the Statements of income and expenditure (as opposed to being capitalised onto the Statement of financial position) as these amounts relate to capital works of Club Houses that are not under the direct control of Surf Life Saving Tasmania.

The Financial Report has been prepared to assist the Executive Committee of Surf Life Saving Tasmania Inc. in meeting the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act 1964 (Tasmania), the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission, and for distribution to

members.

As a result, the Financial Report and this Auditor's Report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Our report is intended solely for the Executive Committee of Surf Life Saving Tasmania Inc and its members and should not be used by or distributed to other parties. We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report, or on the Financial Report to which it relates, to any person other than the Executive Committee of Surf Life Saving Tasmania Inc and its members or for any other purpose than that for which it was prepared.

Other Information

Other Information is financial and non-financial information in Surf Life Saving Tasmania Inc's annual reporting which is provided in addition to the Financial Report and the Auditor's Report. Management are responsible for the Other Information.

Our opinion on the Financial Report does not cover the Other Information and, accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the Financial Report, our responsibility is to read the Other Information. In doing so, we consider whether the Other Information is materially inconsistent with the Financial Report or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

We are required to report if we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this Other Information, and based on the work we have performed on the Other Information that we obtained prior to the date of this Auditor's Report we have nothing to report.
